

Siobhán Hapaska

Château La Coste is pleased to present both a permanent installation and an exhibition of recent work by Irish-Iranian artist, Siobhán Hapaska. Born in 1963, Hapaska has developed a sculptural practice and distinct voice that draws on a dazzling array of materials and forms to reconsider the role of the object in contemporary sculpture. Each loaded with history and multiple readings, these materials are combined in ways that are often surprising. The display in the Old Wine Storehouse gallery at Château La Coste includes biomorphic forms in concrete cloth reaching towards one another, as if trying to touch; glossy fibreglass apples that are constricted by snakeskin-veneered metal channels; a sanctuary lamp that floods the room with purple light, rotating in a perpetual state of crisis. Here we see how Hapaska's work often employs two forms in states of conflict, distress, desire or compassion. In some cases such as the snakeskin and the apple, the references are clear, in this case biblical. However, the choice of forms, materials and fabrication remain mysterious, and the message thus remains unresolved.

Elsewhere, the 'concrete cloth' employs the recent innovation of concrete-infused canvas that was developed for the speedy construction of emergency dwellings. Its use by Hapaska accentuates the biomorphic nature of her work but also speaks to the very contemporary concerns regarding housing for refugees and those suffering the effects of natural disasters.

Alongside this exhibition, Château La Coste will inaugurate a large-scale permanent installation by Siobhán Hapaska, entitled 'Intifada', situated in the hear of an olive grove next to Frank Gehry's music pavilion; Adapted from previous works displayed at the Boijmans Museum in the Netherlands and Art Basel Hong Kong Encounters 2015, it takes the form of three large, open cubes made of anodized aluminum. Each cube is 3 meters square. Shackled horizontally within each is an uprooted olive tree, connected to a vibrating motor. The unsettling result is a spectacular, intimidating, flying forest, floating but trapped, shaking continually in a state of endurance and defiance, as though nature itself is curtailed against its will by mechanics.

For Hapaska olive trees have been at the heart of human civilization for over 6,000 years, a symbol of abundance, peace and goodwill. It is as pertinent a symbol as ever in the context of current, ferocious and seemingly intractable conflict.

Intifada is an Arabic word that literally means, "shaking off," but is now generally translated as rebellion or resistance. This installation seeks to convey a spirit of uprising, not in an obvious political sense but as a 'shaking off' of that which limits the human potential.
